# A COLLABORATIVE MESSAGE FROM THE CEO AND BOARD CHAIR

There are over 493,000 youth living in Arizona communities without access to out-of-school care. For some families, the growing cost of childcare puts available programs outside their reach. For others, programs simply don't exist in their neighborhoods. ICAN believes that, despite these challenges, every child should have access to high-quality out-of-school time care.

It was this vision that inspired us toward some **BIG** growth initiatives in 2022 & 2023.

For the first time in over 30 years, ICAN expanded its program reach beyond the City of Chandler, launching two new satellite programs in partnership with Mesa Public Schools at Adams & Longfellow Elementary. Both communities lacked access to out-of-school resources, but are now enrolling more youth every day to ensure families are fully supported and kids are learning and growing.









ICAN now has 5 program sites, with approximately 700 youth developing life skills, increasing their academic performance, and gaining invaluable career exposures in high-demand fields. Furthermore, the parents of these children now have access to no-cost care, enabling economic opportunity and limiting work interruptions. While we're immensely proud of this impact, we know there is much work to be done. Looking forward, **ICAN will continue to grow our impact**, **contributing to healthy, vibrant communities where everyone has the resources to pursue what is most meaningful to them.** In the pages of this annual report, we'll share some of the specific ways we're planning to increase our impact over the next year. Thank you for being part of our journey - we couldn't do it without you.

Our award-winning, year-round youth development programs enrich the lives of children and their families, setting them up for future success. Throughout the school year and all through summer, ICAN sets school-aged children up for success by supporting three key areas:

- Life Skill Development Building the necessary skills youth need to be personally successful
- Academic Performance Providing literacy, STEAM education, and homework support to encourage on-track graduation and broad academic success
- Workforce Readiness Exposing students to a broad range of career- centric activities at the earliest possible age, when students are most open to personal growth and discovery.

We know that when we support children's growth in these key areas, we leave a lifelong impact on their well-being and set the foundation for a healthy, prosperous future. And because we've removed the cost of this care, their families experience increased economic stability and security.


When children and families prosper, so do our communities. By leading the way for every family to access life-changing childcare, we're building stronger communities across Arizona.

# ICAN YOUTH AND STAFF

In 2021-2022, ICAN was serving around 500 youth annually across three sites. In 2022, we grew to serve approximately 700 youth across five sites! To maintain our 1:22 staff-to-youth ratio, we have expanded the staff team significantly. ICAN's team continues to reflect the communities we serve with 17% of the ICAN staff being program alumni as well!

ICAN has a robust group of tenured staff who have seen the transformation of many youth over the years. Five of our team members have now served the mission of ICAN for over a decade!



# ICAN'S VISION AND FUTURE

After expanding to serve youth across five sites in two cities to support the ever-growing demand for accessible out-of-school time care, systems were restructured to ensure stability and maintain quality.

• Human Resources - As the ICAN team grows, the Human Resources department has grown as well. This includes assessing policies and procedures, advancing staff recruitment, and supporting the ongoing development of ICAN's talent.

• Security Systems - The Chandler Compadres generously supported the build-out of additional security and safety measures to ensure each family continues to feel their child is in a safe and secure environment.

We are grateful for partners who are committed to the well-being of ICAN youth!

• Staffing Structure - As staffing grew with the expansion to new sites, the organization structure required evolution. ICAN developed the Program Area Manager role to directly oversee each of the site leadership creating additional support for the continuity and connection between sites.

• **Program Structure** - In 2023, a Program Framework was developed and implemented across all five sites to ensure consistency across all program sites. This framework aims to maintain quality as more youth and families are served.

## **Summer Camps in Two Cities**

Out-of-school time care during school intercessions is often even more difficult for families to access and afford due to the extended hours of care. In 2023, ICAN grew to provide TWO summer camps to accommodate youth and families in both cities. Thanks to Fiesta Bowl Charities, ICAN hosted our first-ever summer camp in Mesa at Longfellow Elementary, welcoming all Mesa ICAN families to participate. The summer program runs from 9 am-5 pm for seven weeks in Chandler and Mesa, all at no cost to families. Access to childcare changes everything. For youth, it means more support to help them succeed, and more experiences that broaden their thinking and their opportunities. For parents and caregivers, it means freeing up time and resources to focus on bettering the lives of the whole family. **Given the 493,000 children in Arizona lacking access to quality and essential after-school care, ICAN is dedicated to bridging this crucial gap in support and opportunity.** 

## Here's how:

**1. Growing** the reach of our programs at each school- based site to serve a greater number of youth on an annual basis.

**2. Stabilizing** our existing programs throughout expansion, prioritizing quality in systems, staffing, and programming.

**3. Expanding** our efforts even further to reach more youth and families. Our Board of Directors are analyzing how to meet the needs of more communities in the future.

**4. Advocating** along with other organizations and leaders, committed to serving youth and families in Arizona, to create greater access to childcare across the entire state.



Working Smarter, Not Harder

Our sustainable and effective growth model, focused on expanding directly into school sites, allows us to serve more kids while decreasing the cost it takes to serve one child without sacrificing quality.



# AMBASSADORS & ADVOCATES



#### **Executive Partnership:**

Through Bank of America's Loaned Executive Program, ICAN partnered with Miranda Birden for 15 months. Miranda provided key research and analysis and in partnership with the Growth Task Force and Board of Directors, a strategic growth plan was identified that includes key performance indicators which inform the readiness for ICAN's next arowth steps.



• Impact Forum: In June, ICAN hosted an Impact Forum to update stakeholders on key findings that impact the work and community that ICAN serves. Board members Scott Vanderpool, President, Bank of America Phoenix, and Heather Anguiano, Executive Director of Elementary Education, Chandler Unified School District, joined ICAN CEO, Shelby Pedersen, to share findings from the 2023 Metro Latino GDP Report and the Afterschool Alliance America After 3 pm Reports that impact the future vision of ICAN.


# FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

ICAN's **Future of ICAN Fund** supports the organization's growth and capacity needs, ensuring financial sustainability and scalability long into the future.




